
Q1. In 16:9, "For the eyes of the LORD run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to show Himself strong on behalf of *those* whose heart *is* loyal to Him. In this you have done foolishly; therefore from now on you shall have wars," what does it mean? And how can we apply it to our lives?

Q2. In 17:3-4, "Now the LORD was with Jehoshaphat, because he walked in the former ways of his father David; he did not seek the Baals, <sup>4</sup> but sought the God of his father, and walked in His commandments and not according to the acts of Israel," what do these mean in the context? And what can we learn from here?

Q3. In 18:1, "Jehoshaphat had riches and honor in abundance; and by marriage he allied himself with Ahab," what does it mean within the context? And how can we apply it to our lives?

(Background for context of this text on Daily Bible Reading and Studying Weekly Book Basis)

In the last time, 2 Chronicles 15:16-19, "Also he removed Maachah, the mother of Asa the king, from *being* queen mother, because she had made an obscene image of Asherah; and Asa cut down her obscene image, then crushed and burned *it* by the Brook Kidron. <sup>17</sup> But the high places were not removed from Israel. Nevertheless the heart of Asa was loyal all his days. <sup>18</sup> He also brought into the house of God the things that his father had dedicated and that he himself had dedicated: silver and gold and utensils. <sup>19</sup> And there was no war until the thirty-fifth year of the reign of Asa," Asa the 3<sup>rd</sup> king of Judah during 911-870 BC was a good king or a king obedient to God except non-feasance to remove the pagan high places.

<sup>1</sup>In the thirty-sixth year of the reign of Asa, Baasha king of Israel came up against Judah and built Ramah, that he might let none go out or come in to Asa king of Judah.<sup>2</sup> Then Asa brought silver and gold from the treasuries of the house of the LORD and of the king's house. and sent to Ben-Hadad king of Syria, who dwelt in Damascus, saying, <sup>3</sup> "Let there be a treaty between you and me, as there was between my father and your father. See, I have sent you silver and gold; come, break your treaty with Baasha king of Israel, so that he will withdraw from me." <sup>4</sup> So Ben-Hadad heeded King Asa, and sent the captains of his armies against the cities of Israel. They attacked lion, Dan, Abel Maim, and all the storage cities of Naphtali. <sup>5</sup> Now it happened, when Baasha heard *it*, that he stopped building Ramah and ceased his work. <sup>6</sup> Then King Asa took all Judah, and they carried away the stones and timber of Ramah, which Baasha had used for building; and with them he built Geba and Mizpah.

<sup>7</sup> And at that time <u>Hanani the seer</u> came to Asa king of Judah, and said to him: "Because you have <u>relied on the</u> <u>king of Syria</u>, and have <u>not relied on the LORD your God</u>, therefore <u>the army of the king of Syria</u> has <u>escaped from</u> <u>your hand</u>. <sup>8</sup> Were <u>the Ethiopians and the Lubim</u> not <u>a huge</u> <u>army with very many chariots and horsemen</u>? Yet, because you relied on the LORD, He delivered them into your hand.

16 (1-6)= (Asa king of Judah did the interference with Baasha king of Israel's existing treaty with Ben-Hadad king of Syria, making a new treaty with Syria to attack Israel in exchange for silver and gold from the temple of God and his palace. So, Syria did so. Asa was able to stop, through Syria, Israel's building Ramah against Judah's access, taking the stones and timber of Ramah and using for building other cities in Judah. It's successful strategy.)

7-8= (Hannai the seer or prophet scolded Asa king of Judah because he did not rely upon the Lord, but upon the king of Syria even if the strategy was successful. Previously when Asa relied upon God in his crying out to the Lord in Ethiopia's invasion with a million soldiers and 300 chariots, God had struck the Ethiopians; In the beginning, Asa recognized that Judah was not sufficient to defend against Ethiopia the huge invader, called unto the Lord, put himself on the Lord's side. and received the help of the Lord. God brought him victory. Now Asa was strong, rich, and powerful due to God's grace. Upon Israel's threat, he used human strategies relying upon Syria's power regardless of God's counsel; Asa relied upon flesh rather than upon God the Spirit. Upon successful status, it's so dangerous to be tempted by Satan into the area of the flesh, the human wisdom, or the human strategies rather than trust in God. Watch and pray. For even any fleshly success, anyone would not be rewarded from heaven by the Lord because it would be burned out - Note that earthly success is not always heavenly success or the success approved by God 2 Chron 14:9-12; Mat 26:41; 1 Cor 3:13-15<sup>1</sup>)

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> 2 Chron 14:9-12 Then Zerah the Ethiopian came out against them with an army of a million men and three hundred chariots, and he came to Mareshah. <sup>10</sup> So Asa went out against him, and they set the troops in battle array in the Valley of Zephathah at Mareshah. <sup>11</sup> And Asa cried out to the LORD his God, and said, "LORD, *it is* nothing for You to help, whether with many or with those who have no power; help us, O LORD our God, for we rest on You, and in Your

In this you have done foolishly; therefore from now on you shall have wars." <sup>10</sup> Then Asa was angry with the seer, and put him in prison, for he was enraged at him because of this. And Asa oppressed some of the people at that time. <sup>11</sup> Note that the acts of Asa, first and last, are indeed written in the book of the kings of Judah and Israel. <sup>12</sup> And in the thirty-ninth year of his reign, Asa became disease he did not seek the LORD, but the physicians. <sup>13</sup> So	<ul> <li>9=Q1 (Whose heart is loyal to God? Who is after God's own heart? God is just looking for people who are following undividedly God who wants to do a work through them with His resources. Then, your life becomes rich and blessed because God the Spirit just continues to flow through you. Asa was delivered and secured by the Lord in the Ethiopia invasion, now trusting in the security given by the Lord without God's counsel – relying upon flesh, rather than to continue to trust in the Lord. So, the key is just to get continually your heart in harmony with God's heart. Sadly, here are fleshly examples in churches. (1) In prayer we convince God of the validity thing that we are desiring, trying to urge, force, or cajole God into seeing it in our way. It's a sales pitch for a solicit fund to do the thing in a building, a mission field, or any ministry matter. (2) During prayer time, we're informing God of all of our needs although God knows our needs before the prayer <i>Acts</i> 13:22; Mat 6:8; Gal 3:3<sup>2</sup>)</li> <li>10= (Because of the flesh, Asa was angry, forcing others.)</li> <li>12= (Asa ignored God's counsel and visited to the physicians rather than got God's counsel and his visit to the physicians)</li> </ul>

name we go against this multitude. O LORD, You are our God; do not let man prevail against You!" <sup>12</sup> So the LORD struck the Ethiopians before Asa and Judah, and the Ethiopians fled; *Mat 26:41* Watch and pray, lest you enter into temptation. The spirit indeed *is* willing, but the flesh *is* weak." *1 Cor 3:13-15* each one's work will become clear; for the Day will declare it, because it will be revealed by fire; and the fire will test each one's work, of what sort it is. <sup>14</sup> If anyone's work which he has built on *it* endures, he will receive a reward. <sup>15</sup> If anyone's work is burned, he will suffer loss; but he himself will be saved, yet so as through fire.

<sup>1</sup> Then <u>Jehoshaphat his son reigned in his place</u> , and <u>strengthened himself against Israe</u> I. <sup>2</sup> And he placed troops in all the fortified cities of Judah, and set <u>garrisons in the land of Judah</u> and <u>in the cities of Ephraim which Asa his father had taken</u> .	
<ul> <li><sup>3</sup> Now the LORD was with Jehoshaphat, because he walked in the former ways of his father David; he did not seek the Baals, <sup>4</sup> but sought the God of his father, and walked in His commandments and not according to the acts of Israel. <sup>5</sup> Therefore the LORD established the kingdom in his hand; and all Judah gave presents to Jehoshaphat, and he had riches and honor in abundance. <sup>6</sup> And his heart took delight in the ways of the LORD; moreover he removed the high places and wooden images from Judah.</li> <li><sup>7</sup> Also in the third year of his reign he sent his leaders, Ben- Hail, Obadiah, Zechariah, Nethanel, and Michaiah, to teach in the cities of Judah. <sup>8</sup> And with them <i>he sent</i> Levites: Shemaiah, Nethaniah, Zebadiah, Asahel, Shemiramoth, Jehonathan, Adonijah, Tobijah, and Tobadonijah—the Levites; and with them Elishama and Jehoram, the priests. <sup>9</sup> So they taught in Judah, and <i>had</i> the Book of the Law of the LORD with them; they went throughout all the cities of Judah and taught the people.</li> <li><sup>10</sup> And the fear of the LORD fell on all the kingdoms of the lands that were around Judah, so that they did not make war against Jehoshaphat. <sup>11</sup> Also <u>some of the Philistines</u> brought Jehoshaphat presents and silver as tribute; and the Arabians brought him flocks, seven thousand seven hundred rams and seven thousand seven hundred male goats.</li> </ul>	3-4=Q2 (God was with Jehoshaphat king of Judah because he walked in the ways of David, who had been after God's heart, and he sought God who was found by him. So Jehoshaphat experienced God's works – the established reign; received presents, riches, honors; removing idols; teaching the Book of the Law of the Lord through leaders, Levites, and priests; the holy fear of the Lord on all the lands; peace without war; some Philistines and Arabians' giving presents; and increasingly powerful & prosperous Judah nation, through a lot of loyal men of valor & fortified cities until verse 18. 2 Chro 15:1-2 <sup>3</sup> )
<sup>12</sup> So Jehoshaphat became <u>increasingly powerful</u> , and he <u>built fortresses and storage cities in Judah</u> . <sup>13</sup> He had <u>much</u> <u>property</u> in the cities of Judah; and the men of war, mighty men of valor, <i>were</i> in Jerusalem.	

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> 2 Chro 15:1-2 Now the Spirit of God came upon Azariah the son of Oded. <sup>2</sup> And he went out to meet Asa, and said to him: "Hear me, Asa, and all Judah and Benjamin. The LORD *is* with you while you are with Him. If you seek Him, He will be found by you; but if you forsake Him, He will forsake you.

<sup>14</sup> These *are* their numbers, according to their fathers' houses. Of Judah, the captains of thousands: Adnah the captain, and with him three hundred thousand <u>mighty men</u> <u>of valor</u>; <sup>15</sup> and next to him *was* Jehohanan the captain, and with him two hundred and eighty thousand; <sup>16</sup> and next to him *was* Amasiah the son of Zichri, <u>who willingly offered</u> <u>himself to the LORD</u>, and with him two hundred thousand mighty men of valor. <sup>17</sup> Of Benjamin: Eliada a mighty man of valor, and with him two hundred thousand men armed with bow and shield; <sup>18</sup> and next to him *was* Jehozabad, and with him one hundred and eighty thousand prepared for war. <sup>19</sup> These served the king, besides those the king put in the fortified cities throughout all Judah.

<sup>1</sup>Jehoshaphat had riches and honor in abundance; and by marriage he allied himself with Ahab. <sup>2</sup> After some years he went down to visit Ahab in Samaria; and Ahab killed sheep and oxen in abundance for him and the people who were with him, and persuaded him to go up with him to <u>Ramoth</u> <u>Gilead</u>. <sup>3</sup> So Ahab king of Israel said to Jehoshaphat king of Judah, "Will you <u>go with me against Ramoth Gilead</u>?" And he answered him, "I *am* as you *are*, and my people as your people; <u>we will be with you in the war</u>."

<sup>4</sup> Also <u>Jehoshaphat said</u> to the king of Israel, "<u>Please inquire</u> for the word of the LORD today."

1=Q3 (It's a common mistake of believers; Jehoshaphat was made rich by the Lord, now trusting in his flesh without his consideration of God's counsel - unequal voke in the marriage between his son Jehoram and Ahab the evil king's daughter Athaliah; So he lost the first love for God, which he should have seen and repented. And he should have continued to trust in the Lord, being harmony with God's heart. Consequently, through Athaliah, idolatries came again into Judah and David's descendants were almost destroyed. Watch and pray always! 2 Cor 6:14-15; Rev 2:4-5; Jer 6:16; 2 Chr 19:2; 2 Chr 22:10-124)

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> 2 Cor 6:14-15Do not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers. For what fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what communion has light with darkness? <sup>15</sup> And what accord has Christ with Belial? Or what part has a believer with an unbeliever?; *Rev 2:4-5*Nevertheless I have *this* against you, that you have left your first love. <sup>5</sup> Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent and do the first works, or else I will come to you quickly and remove your lampstand from its place—unless you repent; *Jer 6:16*Thus says the LORD: "Stand in the ways and see, And ask for the old paths, where the good way *is*, And walk in it; Then you will find rest for your souls. But they said, 'We will not walk *in it*'; *2 Chr 19:2* And Jehu the son of Hanani the seer went out to meet him, and said to King Jehoshaphat, "Should you help the wicked and love those who hate the LORD? Therefore the wrath of the LORD *is* upon you.; *2 Chr 22:10-12*Now when Athaliah the mother of Ahaziah saw that her son was dead, she arose and destroyed all the royal heirs of the house of Judah. <sup>11</sup> But Jehoshabeath, the daughter of the king, took Joash the son of Ahaziah, and stole him away from among the king's sons who were being murdered, and put him and his nurse in a bedroom. So Jehoshabeath, the daughter of King Jehoram, the wife of Jehoiada the priest (for she was the sister of Ahaziah), hid him from Athaliah so that she did not kill him. <sup>12</sup> And he was hidden with them in the house of God for six years, while Athaliah reigned over the land.

<sup>5</sup> Then the king of Israel gathered <u>the prophets together, four</u> <u>hundred men</u>, and said to them, "<u>Shall we go to war against</u> <u>Ramoth Gilead, or shall I refrain?</u>" So they said, "<u>Go up, for</u> <u>God will deliver it into the king's hand</u>."

<sup>6</sup> But Jehoshaphat said, "*Is there* <u>not still a prophet of</u> <u>the LORD here</u>, <u>that we may inquire of Him</u>?"

<sup>7</sup> So the king of Israel said to Jehoshaphat, "*There is* still <u>one</u> <u>man</u> by whom we may inquire of the LORD; but I <u>hate him</u>, because he <u>never prophesies good concerning me</u>, but always evil. He *is* <u>Micaiah</u> the son of Imla."

And Jehoshaphat said, "Let not the king say such things!"

<sup>8</sup> Then the king of Israel called one *of his* officers and said, "<u>Bring Micaiah</u> the son of Imla <u>quickly</u>!"

<sup>9</sup> The king of Israel and Jehoshaphat king of Judah, <u>clothed</u> <u>in their robes</u>, sat each on his throne; and they sat <u>at a</u> <u>threshing floor</u> at the entrance of the gate of Samaria; and <u>all the prophets prophesied before them</u>. <sup>10</sup> Now <u>Zedekiah</u> the son of Chenaanah had made <u>horns of iron</u> for himself; and he said, "Thus says the LORD: <u>With these</u> you shall <u>gore the Syrians until they are destroyed</u>.' " <sup>11</sup> And <u>all the</u> <u>prophets</u> prophesied so, saying, "<u>Go up to Ramoth Gilead</u> <u>and prosper</u>, for the LORD will deliver *it* into the king's hand."

<sup>12</sup> Then the messenger who had gone to call <u>Micaiah spoke</u> to him, saying, "<u>Now listen</u>, the words of the prophets with one accord encourage the king. <u>Therefore please let your</u> word be like *the word of* one of them, and speak encouragement."

<sup>13</sup> And Micaiah said, "<u>As the LORD lives, whatever my God</u> says, that I will speak."

<sup>14</sup> Then he came to the king; and the king said to him, "Micaiah, <u>shall we go to war against Ramoth Gilead, or shall</u> <u>I refrain</u>?" So <u>one spoke in this manner</u>, and another spoke in that manner.

<sup>20</sup> Then <u>a spirit came forward and stood before the LORD</u>, and said, 'I will persuade him.' 20=("Shall we go to war against Ramoth Gilead, or shall I refrain?" – see the above map, was asked to both false prophets including Zedekiah and Micaiah the true prophet in verses 5 and 14. All false prophets ruled by a lying spirit, allowed by God like Job's case, lied to Ahab and Jehoshaphat the kings to go to war; Jehoshaphat asked God's counsel through a true prophet in verses 4 and 6, but disregarded Micaiah's divine counsel in verses 22 and 24. and 27. He was fleshly persuaded by Ahab and the other false prophets; The verse 14b to go to war was Micaiah's mocking or sarcastic saying to Ahab, Zedekiah, or false prophets who were persuading him to go to war in verse 12 and hated him. It's noted Satan or devils may be conversed with God upon solely God's allowance for God's good purpose. Satan or devils, defeated by Jesus's triumphant victory via His crucifixion with blood and resurrection, accuses Christians day and night until their destruction into the lake of fire. Again watch and prayer always! Job 1:8-10; Rev 12:10-12; Col 2:15<sup>5</sup>)

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> Job 1:8-10 Then the LORD said to Satan, "Have you considered My servant Job, that *there is* none like him on the earth, a blameless and upright man, one who fears God and shuns evil?" <sup>9</sup> So Satan answered the LORD and said, "Does Job fear God for nothing? <sup>10</sup> Have You not made a hedge around him, around his household, and around all that he has on every side? diverted them from him. <sup>32</sup> For so it was, when the captains of the chariots saw that it was not the king of Israel, that they turned back from pursuing him. <sup>33</sup> Now a certain man drew a

(NKJV) -- All Scripture Expositional Study from verse by verse Inductive Studies -- of which application is the Discipleship and Spiritual Formation, closer to the image of Christ. We think that "Any human opinion is not really important rather than what God says. So, the best commentary on the Bible is the Bible per se. But the opinion to make us understand God's Word is acceptable (2 Corinthians 10:5)." Further, for the application, a life or spiritual experience might be helpful to understand how to apply an understood word in the text column, but it is temperately used like Paul, because nobody should think above that actual experience (2 Cor 12:6, Jeremiah 23:28).
